Learning outcomes

Upon completing the course, students should be able to:

- demonstrate the ability to problematize various concepts, issues and theoretical perspectives on migration, with special focus on children and young people,
- demonstrate the ability to problematize the importance of migration processes for children and young people's living conditions, identity and future opportunities in different social and cultural contexts,
- analyze how structural, ideological and social conditions in both the recipient community and the society that was left behind, affect the health, development and learning of children and young people,
- analyze and discuss children's and young people's informal organization and their cultural forms of expression in multicultural societies.

Entry requirements

BA/BSc in education or nursing, 180 credits, or Bachelor's degree, 180 credits with a major in social work and social pedagogy, psychology, pedagogics, sociology, culture studies or public health or the equivalent, and the equivalent of English studies at the upper secondary (high school) level in Sweden, called English 6 or English B.

The forms of assessment of student performance

Student performance is in this course assessed through oral presentations and discussions at two seminars, written group assignments and a final individual, written home examination assignment.
